Jewish settlement

„all older Jewish people here say that their ancestors came here from Vamberk“, according to tradition Jews had originally settled (for a short time?) in Vamberk from where they were later expelled ●●*L

the beginning of Jewish settlement dates back to the times Jews left Vamberk (the expulsion?) (according to rabbi Abraham Kohn from Hradec Králové ●●*K

1640-70: possible beginning of settlement ●●*L

circa 1650: 8 families ●●RJC

1702: *Doudleby – Horní Jelení – Blato estate* 16 Jews (and 1023 Christians) over the age of 10 ●●MPS

1723: 15 families (their names are not given) ●●HBS

1733: *Žamberk – Doudleby estate* in the years 1725-33 the number increased by:

- Joseph Moyses
- Samoel Dawid (from > Rychnov nad Kněžnou) ●●HBS

Fire of Doudleby

1860 ▪ during the fire on 17 August fifteen houses on the northern side of the Jewish street were destroyed (the fire started in the house of Samuel Weissbarth, called Vošblauník), the houses on the southern side of the street including the synagogue survived; „Count František of Bubna... [owner of the chateau and manor] in his nightgown was in charge of the fire engine and tried to extinguish the fire“

 ▪ „people gathered“ in the Jewish quarter but musketeers managed to stop violence
 ▪ the non Jewish murdered was later sentenced and executed
 ▪ The book by David Fanta entitled *Judith, eine Ghettogesichte aus Daudleb*,

Jewish residential district

the Jewish residential district was located on the southern (left) bank of the river Divoká Orlice, west of the bridge across the river, along the road to Příkazy (on the opposite bank of the Orlice river lies the chateau with its outbuildings and the historical core of the village along the main road from Kostelec nad Orlicí to Vamberk)

the Jewish residential district most probably existed in this location as early as the first half of the 18th century

the main axis was the street called Školní ulice (previously called Habrmanova), on the south a parallel street (today the main road called Švermova ulice) – the street Na Benátkách conversely cuts across both streets

Jewish houses formed in the first half of the 19th century a compact whole along the streets Školní ulice and Na Benátkách – however, among the Jewish houses there were also several Christian houses

in the first half of the 19th century there was only one Jewish house (lot no. 161, house no. XXVII) outside the Jewish quarter – it stood 200 meters south-east of the synagogue, on the western (left) bank of the Orlice river ●●BPP,IS,KP

„the ghetto“ (in the place called „Na spáleníšti“) was separated from the remaining part of the village by chains ●●*C

Communal houses

lot no. 105, house no. XVIII, later XIX (area of lot 44 s²):

- house on the northern side of the street Školní ulice, on the corner of the street Na Benátkách

- the entrance to the gallery for women was in the north (from the garden, formerly a narrow street) by a spiral wooden staircase built in the space of the synagogue front hall (the upper part of the staircase is connected with the gallery by an oval Empire style window)
- hall with four surbased arched windows on the northern side and four windows on the southern side
- in the eastern wall of the hall there are two high windows flanking the aron ha-kodesh and a small oval window above it
- the aron ha-kodesh is flanked by two columns surmounted by Empire style vases
- the entrance to the western hall for men is from the north (from the garden, originally from a narrow street), with a stone portal followed by an arched doorway with a Hebrew inscription
- in the northern part of the wall between the western vestibule and the main hall there is an arched window ●●FO,Y/2001

1941 religious services were held until 1941 year

1942 after the deportation of Jews to Theresienstadt (in 1942 year) the interior furnishing of the synagogue was gradually destroyed by local people, towards the end of the war the building was used for a short time as a dormitory for German soldiers and later for Germans fleeing from the eastern front ●●§FH

the Czechoslovak Church rebuilt the synagogue to suit the needs of its prayer hall:

- all the windows in the eastern front were walled in
- „pillars of the outer walls“ were demolished
- the gallery for women on the western side was separated from the main hall by a wall
- a new entrance (on the western side) was built and the old one (on the northern side, with the Hebrew inscription dated 1821-22) was walled in
- a new wooden altar was installed
- on the eastern wall a painting of Christ was executed by the painter Zemánek from Doudleby
- the original benches of the Jewish community were destroyed, so the church was temporarily furnished with folding seats from the local cinema ●●§FH

1954 ceremonial opening of the prayer hall of the Czechoslovak Hussite Church ●●§FH

1966 a columbarium was established in the interior with fifty compartments for urns ●●§FH

1981-82 the eastern, southern and western walls were newly plastered ●●§FH

1983 new benches and a new pulpit were installed ●●§FH

- the northern entrance for men is walled up, the Hebrew inscription above the entrance is well-preserved
 - the northern entrance for women and the spiral staircase to the gallery have been preserved
 - the space of the former gallery is used as an attic (storing apart from other things a couple of original windows), stucco ceiling with painted stars (divided by a wall) has been preserved
 - the stucco ceiling in the main hall has been preserved, the windows in the eastern wall have been walled in
 - the seat of the district office of the parish of the Czechoslovak Hussite Church which owns the building is in Rychnov nad Kněžnou
